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THE EASTER MESSAGE OF ARCHBISHOP KHAJAG BARSAMIAN Primate of the Eastern Diocese of the Armenian Church of America

Who Do Men Say That I Am?

Jesus went onward with his disciples, to the villages of Caesarea Philippi. And on the way he asked his disciples: "Who do men say that I am?" "Some say John the Baptist," they told him; "and others say Elijah. Still others call you one of the prophets." And Jesus asked them again: "But who do you say that I am?" (MARK 8:27-29)

ST. MARK'S GOSPEL invites us to eavesdrop on a very human scene involving Jesus and his companions. We find them on a long walk, bantering as young men do when they're traveling between destinations. At a lull in the conversation, the teacher seizes the opportunity to turn his disciples' thoughts to more serious matters. "Who do men say that I am?" he asks.

The disciples, a bit embarrassed to be suddenly put on the spot, offer a few "approved" answers they had heard from people on the street. But Jesus sees through them—sees that they are evading the point of his question. No, no, he says, perhaps shaking his head: "Who do you say that I am?"

This question—appearing at the midpoint of Mark's gospel—is in fact the central question of the Christian faith. It's a question directed at us, too—and at no time more urgently than at Easter. "Who do you say that Jesus is?"

He is a man who never walked more than a hundred miles from the town of his birth. But for two millennia he has been worshipped as God by people in every remote land—including our homeland of Armenia.

He died hanging on a cross between criminals. He lives seated at the right hand of God the Father. He is servant and master. Commoner and king. The all-powerful Creator of universe—who had no place on Earth to lay his head.

Who do you say that he is?

In the gospel story it is Peter—the loyal, loving fisherman—who receives the flash of insight. He bursts out, "You are the Christ!" with all the enthusiasm of a dazzled student.

And in reply Jesus quietly, deliberately, informs his friends exactly what being the Christ will mean. It means Jesus will suffer; he will be rejected; he will die. But it also means something that, at the time, must have been quite incomprehensible to the disciples: he will rise again.

That's where we meet Jesus on Easter: at his resurrection. One would think that his defeat of death would settle the matter of "who Jesus is" once and for all. But in fact, it only makes the question burn with greater intensity. For ever since that first Easter Sunday, it has become impossible for any human being to evade the question, "Who do you say that Jesus is?"

For our ancestors, their answer led them to establish Armenia as the first Christian kingdom. Centuries later, we uphold their faithful conviction. Yet no Christian can feel smug about giving a "correct" answer. Jesus himself (in the same passage in Mark) was quick to scold Peter—calling him Satan!—when Peter imagined that his insightful answer gave him some control over Christ's mission in the world.

Indeed, the "correctness" of our answer as Christians depends on whether we truly place our lives, our life missions, under Christ's control: into his hands.

It was in this spirit that the martyrs confronted the question of "who Jesus is." Their answer had an urgency we can hardly imagine—because it was not a mere academic issue to them. Their answer was a choice between life and death; yet still they affirmed that Jesus Christ—God incarnate, the redeemer of mankind—was their only acceptable reality.

That same reality will stand before us again this Easter, asking the question first posed to the disciples: "Who do you say that I am?"

The way we answer is consequential, both for ourselves and for our world. For as the surrounding society lurches between extremes of fanaticism and apathy, it moves ever farther from its central axis: the cross of Christ, the empty tomb, the living person of our risen Lord and Savior.

Do we join the world in its aimless wandering? Or hold fast to Jesus Christ? Who do you say that he is?

On Easter Sunday, as we joyfully exchange our beautiful Armenian greeting, worship in church, and receive the precious sacrament of Holy Communion, we must also search within ourselves for the deepest meaning of the day. Each one of us must confront the question: "Who do I say that Jesus is?" And the answer we give must stay alive in our hearts, and evident in our deeds, throughout the year.

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PRAYERS FOR OUR COPTIC BRETHREN

Palm Sunday marked another dark milestone in the ongoing affliction suffered by the Coptic Church, when a bomb explosion tore through the St. Mark Coptic Cathedral and the St. George Church in Egypt. It was not the first time the cathedral - seat of authority for the Coptic Church's pope, His Holiness Pope Tawadros II - was targeted. This time, at least 45 people lost their lives, with more than 100 injured.

The fact that this outrage took place on Palm Sunday only makes the action more horrifying - and the perpetrators, the terrorists of ISIS, all the more contemptible.

His Holiness Karekin II, the Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of All Armenians, communicated with the authorities of the Coptic Church, extending a spirit of solidarity and Christian love for our persecuted brothers and sisters, and sending them the sincere condolences of the faithful of the Armenian Church.

With the feast of our Lord's resurrection still a glowing our minds, and with the liturgical remembrances of Christ's persecution and suffering uppermost in our hearts, let us keep our Coptic brethren in our prayers. May our Lord Jesus Christ shine his light into our world, and may our humble prayers help to ease the suffering of our sister church at this time.

On Friday, April 21, the CT Genocide Committee hosted a fund raiser here at Holy Resurrection. A wonderfully planned Wine & Cheese Reception was held in honor of former U.S. Ambassador to Armenia, the Hon. John M. Evans. Ambassador Evans presented two of his most recent books for the public, and offered a very engaging style in creating conversation with everyone present to make it an enjoyable evening for all. The following morning, Amb. Evans was the Guest Speaker at the Capitol for our community's annual Genocide Remembrance Program. His most poignant remark of the weekend, was when at the Capitol he shared with all his advice to U.S. State Department Officials, that not categorizing the atrocities committed against the Armenian people is "the worse case of alternative facts in the last 100 years." Every Armenian should be grateful for the efforts of Ambassador Evans, who paid the ultimate professional 'price' for his honesty and bravery by being relieved of his duties, for not heeding U.S. State Department advise and used the word "Genocide" for the Armenian people.

IN THE CHURCH



When you are attending the church service, let your apparel be appropriate and modest. Abstain from adornments and flashy clothing which are not suitable in a church setting, where a spirit of concentration and meditation is required as a precondition to participate in a communal prayer.

As you enter the church, it is appropriate to cross yourself. It is also an age long Armenian tradition, just as it is customary in Eastern Orthodox and Catholic churches too, to light a

candle as a way of placing yourself in a contemplative mood.

The lighting of the candle is also a symbol of the sacrifice of the self and the radiance of Christian's love. Just as the candle burns and is consumed to spread light, so must every Christian man and woman live to radiate love, light and warmth.

It is a genuine Armenian custom of piety to light the candle in front of an anointed picture of a Saint, to pose for a moment, and breathe a prayer of self-dedication and to prepare oneself spiritually to participate in the church service.

Like everywhere else that we receive information from, we will increasingly be relying on e-mail to keep you informed as to the life of our church. This will allow us to keep you better informed and will provide you with better quality publications.
